a. la resolución (f)	An out-of-court settlement would be beneficial for both parties. — Una resolución extrajudicial sería beneficiosa para las dos partes.
3. (village)	
a. el asentamiento (m)	The earliest Spanish settlements in America were located in the Antilles islands. — Los primeros asentamientos españoles en América se ubicaron en las islas Antillas.
b. el poblado (m)	My friend grew up in a small settlement near the coast. — Mi amigo creció en un pequeño poblado cercano a la costa.

5. (payment)	
a. el pago (m)	I finally agreed on a settlement of a thousand dollars with my insurance company. — Finalmente acordé con mi aseguradora el pago de mil dólares por mi reclamo.
b. la liquidación (f)	I need to send a check in settlement of my hospital bill. — Necesito enviar un cheque para la liquidación de mi cuenta en el hospital.
