a word or phrase open to two interpretations, one of which is usually risqué or indecent.

"he was unable to get through two consecutive sentences without a smutty double entendre"

to mend (to repair) ***

Here are the dictionary definitions:

mend = a verb

Meanings:

to repair something that is broken or damaged:

Could you mend this hole in my shirt?

I've left my watch at the jeweller's to be mended.

The plumber came to mend the burst pipe.

The country's president is seeking to mend relations with the United States.

repair= a verb

+object **go down** badly (adv) / **well** (adv) **with** +object. (ir mal/bien)

"the comedian's Nazi jokes didn't go down well with the Jewish audience"

To come/go down with something. (contraer)

go in for something.

to do **something** regularly, or to enjoy **something**: I've never gone in for spending all day at the beach.

All my **money** goes on **drugs**.

To **go over** +object.

(examine or look at something in a careful or detailed way)

ebb (el reflujo, menguar)

the movement of the tide out to sea.

"the tide was **on the ebb**"

(of tidewater) move away from the land; recede.

"the tide began to ebb"

(Don't let it) Go to your head: when

some praise or flattery makes a person feel better or more superior than he/she really is.

go on record. also be on **record.** If you **go on record** or if you are on **record** as saying something, you say it publicly and officially and it is written down. (constar en acta/ testify.)

To **go off** on/at a **tangent.** (irse por las ramas)

to make a go of something

(idiomatic) To attempt **to make** a success of (**something**); especially, to attempt **to make** a living. He quit his regular job and tried **to make a go** of it as an artist.

Hissy fit (una rabieta)

To be **made up** **composed** of **comprised** +object

To consist of (verb+ing)

Meanings

1 to put something that is damaged, broken or not working

correctly, back into good condition or make it work again:

to repair (the surface of) the road

to repair a roof after a storm

The garage said the car was so old it wasn't worth repairing.

I really must get my bike repaired this weekend.

fix = a verb

1. to repair something:

They couldn't fix my old computer, so I bought a new one.

I **could do with** a cup of tea.

to want or need someone or something; to benefit **from** someone or something. *I could do with a nice cool drink right now. I could do with some help on this project.*
