They **glossed over** the problem, hoping that the customers wouldn't notice. (transitive, idiomatic) To treat something with less care than it deserves; to ignore.

To ham it up

ham up. Exaggerate or overdo, especially with extravagant emotion, as in **Hamming up** the eulogy was disgraceful, especially since he didn't even know the deceased. It is also put as **ham it up**, meaning "overact," as in She loves to **ham it up** in front of the class.
