The **+object** is the bane of my existence (an object of great annoyance)

The noun **bane** refers to anything that is a cause of harm, ruin, or death. But we often use it for things that aren't that bad, just feel like it. You might say mosquitoes are the **bane** of your existence. The source of this word is Middle and Old English bana, **meaning** "destroyer, murderer."
