<p>IC future forms</p> <p>be going to + infinitive</p> <p>future plans and intentions</p> <p>My sister's going to adopt a child. Are you going to buy a new car? I'm not going to go to New York next week.</p> <p>predictions</p> <p>I think they're going to win. (They're playing very well.) It's going to rain. (The sky is very dark.)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Use going to NOT will / won't when you have already decided to do something. With the verb go you can leave out the infinitive. <p>I'm not going (to go) to New York.</p>	<p>present continuous: be + verb + -ing</p> <p>future arrangements</p> <p>We're getting married in October. They're meeting at 10.00. She's leaving on Friday.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> You can usually use present continuous at going to for future plans / arrangements. going to shows that you have made a decision. We're going to get married in the summer. Present continuous emphasizes that you have made the arrangements. We're getting married on July 12th (e.g. we've booked the church). 	<p>will / shall + infinitive</p> <p>I'll have the steak. (instant decision) I won't tell anybody where you are. (promise) I'll carry that bag for you. (offer) Shall I help you with your homework? (offer) Shall we eat out tonight? (suggestion) You'll love the film! (prediction)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Use will / won't (NOT the present simple) for instant decisions, promises, offers, and suggestions. Use shall (NOT will) with I and we for offers and suggestions when they are questions. Use will or going to for predictions.

informal plenty of

• sufficient, plenty (of), a sufficient amount (of), an adequate amount (of), as much as necessary;

a sufficiency, an adequacy, an ample supply, a satisfactory amount, a passable amount, a tolerable amount, an acceptable amount, an abundance, an amplitude;

full measure

"there's enough for everyone"

antonyms: insufficient

"in large enough numbers"

antonyms: insufficiently

• used for emphasis.

"curiously enough, there is no mention of him"
