<p>to avoid (OBJECT PRONOUN) verb+ing +object.</p> <p>While similar, the verbs <b>avoid</b> and <b>prevent</b> are not the same idea. To <b>avoid</b> is to not go near something that is currently happening. To <b>prevent</b> is to stop something from existing or happening altogether.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><b>prevent</b> = to stop something from happening or someone from doing something:</li> <li><b>avoid</b> = to stay away from someone or something.</li> </ul> <p>However, if you <i>avoid doing</i> something, this can be more or less synonymous with <i>preventing</i> it. Example:</p> <p>Most workplace accidents can be <b>avoided/prevented</b> with proper safety training.</p> <p>Think of this use of <i>avoid</i> as metaphorically "dodging" a situation. If you can <i>avoid</i> the conditions where something can happen (or avoid being in that situation at all) you have effectively <i>prevented</i> it from happening</p>
